Once, every Maine town proudly met at their local sandy oval to show off agricultural products, latest horse drawn vehicles and livestock. Winning blue ribbons and the bragging rights attached to them for the following year were the prizes of the day.

Carriages and people of every description would crowd the grassy infields to watch various horse-drawn competitions whether it was a horse race, pulling competition or carriage show. Betting added to the festive atmosphere. The social gatherings often included a tailgate picnic. It was not unlike today's "parking lot" barbeque tailgate picnics before a sports event.

Why were people snowshoeing through the woods at Skyline Farm? ..at night! ..in the sleet! On February 27, thirteen people participated in the "Owl Prowl" put on by the Royal River Conservation Trust and Maine Audubon Society.

Bill Hancock, who is involved with both organizations, presented a slideshow in the farm's Visitor Center which introduced Maine's owls and their habits. Then the group bundled up against the elements and snowshoed on the farm's trails to call for owls. Bill played a recording of specific owls, and the small crowd grew silent when they thought they heard a great horned owl ... or was it just the wind whistling through the trees during the sleet storm?

After the night walk was over, the participants were filled with excitement over what they had just experienced. Maine Audubon Staff Naturalist Judy Walker of Freeport and June LaCombe of Pownal agreed that it was "a great program! It was lovely to be outside at night in the winter". June continued, "I was waiting with anxious anticipation, waiting to see if we saw any owls. I get the same feeling when I'm fishing."

Bill Hancock said, "Skyline Farm is a beautiful site for a night walk. It has a nice forest." He and Amanda Devine, RRCT Stewardship Coordinator, both hope to work with Skyline's trustees to bring more events like this to the Farm.

## Skyline Farm Facilities Update by Paul Lones

We are finally seeing some bare ground at Skyline Farm, and the South slopes of the fields are even showing signs of greening up a bit. It has been a long winter, with much of our volunteer efforts focused on removing snow. Thanks to those who helped with this seemingly never-ending chore.

One important project was completed over the course of the winter. Margaret Totten kindly refinished the front door of the farmhouse. This door had many coats of paint and required repair as well as new paint. It is nice to be able to continue to use this original door, where it has hung for over 120 years! The door will be re-hung in late April or early May, depending on weather. Thank you, Margaret.

This spring and summer hold a wide range of indoor and outdoor projects being planned. Many improvement projects are suitable for volunteers: interior and exterior painting, landscaping and gardening, light carpentry and trail work.

A few examples of these job assignments include:

- Painting any of several downstairs rooms in the farmhouse
- Cleaning up the garden beds from their winter rest
- Grading around the farmhouse to improve drainage
- Painting the North side of the barn that received new clapboards late last autumn.
- Painting the South side of the farm house.
- Mulching part of the trail to prevent erosion
- Cleaning up fallen tree limbs on the trails


There are other similar volunteer job opportunities as well. Many projects can be broken down into smaller sub-categories, and Skyline Farm will provide the materials.

*The Hearts of Horses: A Novel by Molly Gloss, Houghton Mifflin Co., 2007*

I heard an intriguing interview on NPR's "Morning Edition" which sent me off to the Portland Public Library to get *The Hearts of Horses*. Molly Gloss sounded so honest in her knowledge of and interest in 1917-18 Oregon. A time when young men were off fighting the "war to end all wars" and those left at home in the high dry valleys of Eastern Oregon struggled on remote farms and ranches.

Nineteen year old Martha Lessen with her three horse string leave a sad home life to try her hand at breaking horses over the Ipsoot Pass into Elwha County. With the help of the first rancher she meets and his wife, she sets up a 15-mile "circle ride" from ranch to ranch, and back every day, gentling and riding the young broncos in ways that are far different than the often cruel methods of the broncobusters.



Martha in her quiet way becomes important in the lives of all the circle ranches bringing mail, supplies, and a kind face to talk to where sometimes there is only loneliness, injury and illness. Molly Gloss gets the horse aspects of the book just right.

It is a time when horses and carriages/wagons are coming to the end of their useful life in the West. A few ranchers have automobiles which, although useless in the winters and mud season, are soon to replace horses as a way of life.

Martha's story ends entirely too soon. The people she meets, the horses she rides, and the time almost 100 years ago are so beautifully presented to the reader that you savor each chapter knowing that all too soon Martha Lessen will become one of your all-time favorite fictional characters. Her story will be one to highly recommend to a friend. I just did.

We all have our stories of interesting horse-drawn vehicle "finds". This is one of ours.

### *Prologue*

Many years ago my family went on vacation from Braintree, Massachusetts, to Antigonish, Nova Scotia, and visited a local antique auto museum. Among the many cars on display was one horse-drawn vehicle: a beautiful surrey; complete with the original leather fenders, upholstery and lamps! Fortunately the maker's plate was still in place in the usual spot on the rear axle: Folger and Drummond, Amesbury, Massachusetts.

After corresponding with the museum owner we learned that he would consider selling the vehicle and a short time later, on a September weekend trip with a U-Haul trailer, we all returned and brought the vehicle back to the USA.

### *Full Circle*

The museum owner said that he had purchased the surrey at a local antique shop and the following summer we went there and learned that it had been purchased from a family who lived nearby. Family members remembered the vehicle well and told us that an elderly uncle, who had worked as a chauffeur in Milton, Massachusetts, had been given the vehicle many years earlier when the family for whom he had worked switched from horse-drawn transportation to an automobile. The surrey was shipped by train to Nova Scotia where it was used for many, many years.

A check of the telephone book revealed that the same family was still living in the same house in Milton! The

gentleman who answered the telephone remembered the elderly chauffeur well and spoke highly of him; remembering that he had passed away, in 1941 as I recall. We visited the barn where the surrey had been kept completing the full circle on this vehicle.

We always considered it such a happy coincidence that this vehicle, made in the great carriage center of Amesbury, Massachusetts, and originally sold to a family in Milton, had returned, after so many years, and so many miles, to a family living just a few miles away from Milton, in Braintree!

### *Epilogue*

The individual history of each horse-drawn vehicle can be so very interesting! It truly gives each vehicle its own personality and indeed, its "life". In the case of this beautiful surrey, knowing that it came from the carriage factory of Folger and Drummond places it in its city, building and time of origin.

We have since located original advertising material on this interesting company, as well as photographs of the two gentlemen for whom the firm was named. To know right to the street address where the vehicle was used for regular transportation for so many years also makes it special.

Every vehicle has its story. Please write them down and preserve them! They are interesting now; will be even more fascinating in the future; and only we in the present can preserve them for all time.

## In review: "Good Sledding" Exhibit

Skyline Farm's third winter exhibit, which ran from February 2 through March 23, was well-received by the many visitors who came to learn the variety of ways in which nineteenth century folks handled driving conditions on snow and ice.

The name of the exhibit was derived by a phrase used in that era. The people would note "good sledding" in their diaries when conditions that day were optimum for visiting their neighbors.

The carriage and sleigh museum exhibit portrayed examples of snowshoes, skis, and nineteenth century sleighs to give visitors a sense of how people back then took advantage of the snow-pack to revel in recreational pursuits.

The display drew much praise from first-timers as well as from returning visitors. Thanks to all of the many docents who brought the museum to life by interpreting the exhibit for the appreciative guests.

## Stormy Weather School Bus Sleigh

One of the most popular displays of the "Good Sledding" exhibit, admired by children and adults alike, was the Stormy Weather School Bus Sleigh. It was generously on loan from the Knight Family of Smiling Hill Farm located in Westbrook, Maine.

This charming sleigh is believed to be over 100 years old. Its first use was likely by Roger Knight's aunt, Vesta Knight, as a winter service ve-

hicle on her rounds to deliver milk and farm items to customers in Portland's East End.

As a school bus, it was probably put into service in the mid 1920's to go to the Valentine Street School in Westbrook. Being enclosed, it offered protection from the bad weather. This sleigh was used into the early 1930's and has been stored at Smiling Hill Farm since then.

## "Fertile Ground" Art Exhibit and Sale with Silent Auction
